Could we somehow "talk" the right theological rhetoric, but miss the true essence of Christianity in our walk with Christ? Unfortunately, yes! Paul stuns us with this sobering reality in 1 Corinthians 13—the love chapter.

I could speak eloquently, possess the gift of prophecy, wisdom, or knowledge; have rock-solid faith, give generously to the poor, and even die a martyr's death. Yet, if I don't have God's divine agape-love, it's all wasted, useless. Ouch to my "Christian" ego.

As another Valentine's Day holiday has just come and gone, Hallmark and Hollywood tried to convince us that sentimental, mushy, or me-centered love is the real thing—the love to cultivate. Yet the Holy Spirit taps us on the shoulder with the reminder that God has something much better in the gift of His selfless, self-sacrificing, agape-love. This is the real thing. Bask in the beauty of His love for you as you read the Spirit's description in 1 Corinthians 13:4–8.

Prophecies will fail. Tongues will cease. Knowledge will vanish. Yes, but God's love never fails! This is the love to have, to hold, and to share with others so they can see Jesus in us!

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Shaken Together employs a novel method of meeting people and developing relationships in our local area.

Over the past few months, I have developed good friendships with two people in a local museum. I began by offering rice, apples, and peaches at discount prices and asking a few questions. This has allowed us to begin discussing non-controversial topics. Over time, one man appreciates the free dried fruit samples that I share at his office. Recently, this has led to a thirty-minute discussion about "the rapture" in that office. At another location we engaged in a conversation about wine and alcohol in the Bible.

Beyond simply providing rice, popcorn, and cornmeal flour, we are introducing Adventists to the community in a way that develops friendships. A new definition of Adventists: "the folks with simple wholesome food for body and soul."

# Monthly Memory Verse

"Thus says the Lord, 'Heaven is My throne, and the Earth is My footstool."
Where is the house that you will build Me? And where is the place of My rest?
For all those things My hand has made, And all those things exist,'
Oays the Lord: 'But to this one will I look: On him who is poor
and of a contrite spirit, and who trembles at My Word.'"

Isaiah 66:1, 2 (NKJV)
